Applications and Fees

- 3. **Official** high school transcript with rank-in-class (and courses in progress if you have not yet graduated); or official GED scores.

Admission Requirements*

UNM admits freshmen from regionally accredited high schools to bachelor degree programs under one of three sets of criteria:

- **1.** Minimum of a 2.25 average or better on a 4.00 scale for all high school courses **plus** completion of the following 13 specific college preparatory units (two semesters equal one unit) with at least a 2.25 average:
 - 4 English, one of which must be 11th or 12th grade composition;
 - 3 Math, including algebra I, algebra II, geometry, trigonometry, calculus, or higher mathematics;
 - 2 Social Science, one of which must be U.S. history;
 - 2 Natural Science, one of which must be a laboratory science in biology, chemistry, or physics; and
 - 2 Foreign Language, both of which must be the same language other than English, or evidence of proficiency in a second language.
 (Please contact the Office of Admissions with questions concerning the acceptability of specific classes or the accreditation of high schools.)

2. Minimum of a 2.25 average in all high school courses, plus a formula based on ACT or SAT scores and high school class rank:

3. A limited "Special Admissions" category: Students who do not qualify for admission under criteria 1 or 2 may request "special consideration" through an appeal process. A combination of quantitative and subjective factors are used in making these admissions decisions.
